VBS Kids Support Pride Camp!

Our VBS participants collected supplies valued at approximately \$200 for Iowa Safe Schools' Pride Camp during Vacation Bible School this year!

Pride Camp, which will be held mid-July, provides a safe and affirming place for LGBTQ & allied youth ages 14-18 to learn valuable life skills and network with other LGBTQ youth in a supportive and nurturing environment. An overwhelming majority of the thousands of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, and Questioning high school students in Iowa report feelings of loneliness, discrimination, sadness, and lack of interaction with other student like them. Pride Camp is an epic, life changing program for LGBTQ and allied youth to learn, grow, and connect with each other. Pride Camp is the first of its kind in the Midwest and aims to build the resiliency of youth who identify with a marginalized population, and to build tomorrow's leaders. At Collegiate/Wesley, for two weeks, we collected supplies like tape, copy paper, pens, pencils, batteries, dish soap and more. The Iowa Safe Schools team was very appreciative of the donations.



Living in a Post General Conference 2019 Era. Where are we at?

United Methodists across the connection are finding themselves seeking new ways of connecting, learning and resisting in a post General Conference 2019 era. Collegiate/Wesley, one of the forefront progressive congregations in Iowa, did the work 20 years ago to take a clear stance on full inclusion of all of God's beloved creation, but the larger United Methodist Church has not been able to do such work. The passage of the Traditional Plan was a tragic move by the Special Called General Conference this past February, and progressives across the globe are refusing to abide by this unjust and punitive set of rules. We are seeing new groups form and a renewed sense of urgency to center the voices of our queer/trans and persons of color (POC) kin. In other words, progressives are committing themselves to listening to those who are most marginalized in the church and learning from their resistance. This, friends, is long overdue.

In May, Pastor Jen and Lauren Loonsfoot went to a gathering up in Minneapolis called Our Movement Forward. This group, led by queer + trans +POC, centered the conversation around remembering our history and the resistance of our kin. Lauren shared that, "The conversations at Our Movement Forward centered around what's next. Over 300 persons gathered for worship, lament, community and sharing. While we were there, we were divided into three paths. The paths were, leave the denomination and start something new, stay in the denomination and resist from within and a hybrid model that lived in between the two. Within each path individuals processed through a series of discussion questions. At the end of the process individuals and groups were able to submit action items that will continue to move us forward. I'm so glad that I was able to attend and hear where others are focusing their attention and energy moving forward."

Following the OMF conversation, I was invited to join the UMC Next conversation down in Kansas City. This conversation, while intended to be more diverse and inclusive, was not as explicitly centered around queer + trans + POC voices like the OMF gathering. This group was made up of 10 progressive/centrist clergy and lay persons from each conference. The body confirmed that there is little desire to stay within the denomination

and reform. Instead, the body affirmed a desire to either disaffiliate with the UMC or dissolve the UMC and form a new thing. One very positive outcome, and one that continues to give me hope, is that the Iowa delegation has commitment to working with Iowa OMF delegation to be in conversation about how to best move forward. This work is just beginning and more information will come.

The Iowa Annual Conference met June 7-11th in Des Moines. Collegiate/Wesley was well represented and took up 3 whole tables, including 4 Wesley students. This year, C/W delegates handed out rainbow lanyards to show our support and make a statement. It was wonderful to see 400+ delegates wearing rainbow lanyards around their necks all weekend! Some wonderful things happened at AC this year. For the first time, a progressive slate was presented to delegates and the ENTIRE progressive slate was elected! 35-36 delegates elected to General Conference/Jurisdictional Conference and reserves are progressives! The delegates were overwhelmingly diverse and young. This is part of a movement across the country. The AC body also passed a Disapproval of the Traditional Plan. Great things happened at AC, but there is still much more work to be done. What does all of this mean for Collegiate/Wesley? It means that the Spirit is definitely moving. It means that other people are joining us in the work of building a church that is truly open to all people. It means that we still have a lot of work to do. It means that we need to lean in and listen to our queer + trans + POC kin. It means that the Traditional Plan will still be in place beginning January 1, 2020, but we can unite with those resisting and working towards a new thing. God is indeed doing a new thing.



God is Proud of YOU

I wear my God is Proud of You shirt all of the time. I am constantly getting thumbs up and little comments like, “awesome shirt” and “love the shirt”. I have had some great conversations because of this shirt. Honestly, the best conversations happen in the gas station check out line. Sometimes these conversations are with people purchasing goods and sometimes I hear the best questions from those working behind the counter. Such a conversation happened to me the other day when in another town.

I made a last minute decision to stop and get something to drink after a long day at confirmation camp. I ran into the deserted store and quickly grabbed some water. My hope was to be in and out and home as soon as possible. The very kind person behind the counter smiled at me and inquired about my shirt. They said, “I like your shirt. Is it about bi people?” Such a specific question, so I figured they were talking about something personal to them. My immediate reaction was, “Yes. It sure is.” They proceeded to ask me about how a church can believe that God really is proud of lgbtqia+ persons. They shared how they had been harmed and told that God does not like gay people and that they are living and sin and need to change their lives before God would accept them. My heart was broken. These are the conversations that happen all of the time when wearing this shirt. People are surprised that God and churches really love and want gay people. Thankfully, I was in a town where I knew the local UMC congregation and pastors. It was awesome to tell them that if they were interested in a church that felt similarly to the church who proudly wears these shirts, and that they could find such a community in their own town.






Summerfest

Rummage RAMPage 2019

Do you have spare furniture, housewares, etc. you want to re-home while supporting Ames and Story County not-for-profits, like CUMC/WF? Do you love the thrill of treasure hunting or finding a bargain? Do you love when Ames streets look neat and clean even during the July rental lease turnover? If any of these are true, please donate, shop, and/or spread the word about the Rummage RAMPage.

This annual event is held at the Ames Intermodal Facility (the parking ramp just south of the church: 129 Hayward). It is a collaboration by the City of Ames and ISU Office of Sustainability. Rummage RAMPage is staffed by volunteers from local not-for-profits whose organizations receive an allocated share of the profits.

Donations and sales occur at the same time so the inventory is constantly changing. The last day is half price. Since the 2016 inception, the event has diverted 224,040 pounds of furniture and housewares from the Boone landfill for items that are not usable as fuel by the Ames Resource Recovery plant and distributed over \$37,000 in proceeds to not-for-profits who staff the event.

It is a **cash only** sale. Most items are priced \$1 to \$50.

Acceptable donations for the sale: furniture, small electronics, flat screen TVs, household storage, baskets, kitchenware, sporting equipment, and houseplants.

Accepted and then passed through directly to other agencies (such as the Ames Animal Shelter, food pantries, and Ames Public Library): clothing, shoes, books, school supplies, toiletries, non-perishable food, and gently used blankets/sheets/towels.

Unacceptable donation items include, but are not limited to, mattresses/box springs, bed pillows, TVs that are not flat screens, household hazardous waste, expired/perishable food, major appliances (microwave OK, dorm size fridge OK, full size oven not OK), bike helmets, infant/child car seats, and cribs. If rejected at the event and you still want to get rid of the item, standard Ames Resource Recovery Plant disposal fees apply.

New in 2018, several conservation organizations partnered to offer an opportunity to re-home pets that might have otherwise been released to the wild. Non-native fish and animals can die or cause damage to the environment if not released to the wild properly. Intake is done by representatives of those organizations. Two fish and a bearded dragon were taken in in 2018 during the event.

Donations can be dropped off July 26 through August 2 at the Ames Intermodal Facility. Donations can also be dropped off before July 26th at the Ames Resource Recovery Plant any time during normal business hours (7-3 M-F, 8-noon Saturday) for \$10/carload or \$25/truckload. Curbside/driveway pickup service is also available (\$10 for college students; \$25 for Ames residents). Register and pre-pay for curbside/driveway donation pickup service at <https://www.vcstory.org/rummage-rampage-pick-up/pick-up>.

New to the sale in 2019, there will be rare and unique finds (boutique style) section, a make an offer section for furniture which needs a little handiwork to be usable such as a 3 legged couch, and tracking the intake date for potential markdowns.

From The Trustees

Greetings Friends and Happy Summer! Even though the weather hasn't been the best, it hasn't slowed us down! This is the first of many communications to let you know what we've been up to. The Board of Trustees is involved with a lot of the day-to-day life at Collegiate Wesley, but here are the exciting parts.

Many of you might have noticed the new camera signs on the doors and we are very pleased to announce that our camera project has been completed. In this day, safety is very important, so we had cameras installed to protect our entrances and the exterior of our building. Don't worry, the cameras are only in public areas so won't be able to catch you nodding off during the service! These cameras also give us the ability to monitor the building remotely to always be on the watch.

After the sermon on climate change, we felt called to help reduce our carbon footprint and we are doing this in two big ways. The first is with our building climate control system. With the help of the Energy Research Team, we are replacing our outdated climate controls with a new advanced one. This will allow us to also be able to control the thermostats in other parts of the building instead of just Wesley Hall and the Sanctuary. By broadening our climate controls, we will be able to better regulate and control the climate in the building, thus, lowering our utility costs. The second way we are reducing our carbon footprint is changing our lighting. In the past month, we switched out all of our hallways, office, gathering space, student lounge, and preschool lighting over to new LED lighting. We also switched the main outside lights to LED as well. This change will save us an estimated \$2,967.69 a year, and \$26,134.87 over the course of their lifetime.

In addition to the work to increase the efficiency of the building, we currently are working on replacement windows in the education wing hallway along with the nursery.

This is just a glimpse into the past month or so with the work we are doing to keep Collegiate Wesley going. As always, you are free to reach out to us with any concerns, questions, or comments.
