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## A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR MARY

Advent and Christmas are times of making memories and recalling memories. We set up the tree, we decorate our homes, schools, and churches; we bake. And for older children and adults, we remember Christmas past: who was with us, where we went, how we gifted and were gifted. All of this weaves us into a fabric of love and support no matter what. This year at Collegiate/Wesley our theme is How Does A Weary World Rejoice? How do we in the midst of the many sorrows and confusions in the world, rejoice in our personal relationships, our fellowship together as a welcoming congregation, our identity as members of the community of Ames, and our certainty of God with us personally and together? We find an answer by taking a look at some of the early Biblical people who also lived in uncertain times and who found joy in their relationships and experiences of God. We find an answer in experiencing together the feeling of purpose and of hope. Because we are with each other in our Collegiate/Wesley community, we can feel hope that we are not alone, that we are a part of something vital. I invite you to join in on our Advent services and programs as we journey to the manger of Bethlehem.

The great testimony of Christmas is that because God came into the world in the baby Jesus on that night long ago, so everyone counts, everyone matters. And ever since the first Christmas, it is appropriate that we ask ourselves and name the names of people who have mattered to us and to place ourselves in the association of these great witnesses to the faith. This, too, is a part of the hope that we can experience. We are surrounded in the present time and in a spiritual time by so great a cloud of witnesses.

What we believe and what we know about love is carried on by us in good and powerful ways and, truth be told, sometimes in broken and limited ways. But we learn again and again as we meet the baby Jesus who has come into the world to be with us that without love we are lost. With love, which as the Bible tells us, comes from God, we are able to create, to be curious, to engage with others and the world, and to feel the grace and acceptance that God gives us through Love. Our hope is founded on this.

On a night long ago, in a stable, under a star of mystery, God's angels sang a song – perhaps it was a lullaby – to put love at the center of our lives. May we hear the song again this year, in our hearts, in our preparations, and in our commitment to find hope amidst the weary world.



Starting November 26th



Christ was born into a weary world. King Herod ruled the land with a legacy of ruthlessness. The Romans treated the people imposing harsh taxes and land seizures that forced many into subsistence farming.

Poverty and destitution were pervasive. And yet, Christ was born, bringing good news of great joy for all people. As Advent comes again to a weary world, we ask, "How does a weary world rejoice?" From the opening chapters of Luke's Gospel, we have found a few answers: we acknowledge our weariness, we find joy in connection, we allow ourselves to be amazed, we sing stories of hope, we make room, we root ourselves in ritual, and most importantly, we trust our belovedness. In the parallel birth stories of Jesus and John, joy arrives—despite trepidation, fear, or grief. In these stories, we find rhythms for rejoicing. As we move through our series, we hope to create space for acknowledging the weariness of our world while celebrating God's closeness with great joy.

And so, this Advent, we will hold space for our weariness and our joy. We will seek a "thrill of hope" in our hurting world. We will welcome joy-even if, like the prophet Isaiah, we cry out for comfort (Isaiah 40:1). In this weary world, may we find many ways to rejoice.

## ADVENT SPECIAL OFFERING

#### UMCOR- INTERNATIONAL DISASTER RESPONSE

UMCOR is processing grants to support those impacted by the ongoing conflict in Israel and Gaza. One grant supports a partner providing psychological treatment and counseling to women and children and the other grant will provide telemedicine funding for mothers and children in need of follow-up care. Recently, getting humanitarian aid where it is needed most has become more difficult.

UMCOR has been working diligently to provide emergency assistance to those impacted by the conflict in Israel and Gaza. An emergency grant has been awarded to a local partner who used UMCOR funds to procure and distribute hygiene kits for internally displaced people in Gaza. UMCOR is working with partners in Israel to provide humanitarian relief there as well.

We invite you to continue praying for a peaceful resolution to this conflict.
