Message from Pastor Mary

When I was growing up, the church I attended did not have an Ash Wednesday service. **The distribution of ashes was not a part of that church's history or rituals. I suppose** when I was a kid in a Congregational church, the distribution of ashes seemed like a part of the Catholic Church and its rituals. So, it was when I was an adult and entering into the ministry in the United Methodist Church that I first became acquainted more deeply with the ritual and meaning around the distribution of ashes. I came to understand how this simple act of remembering our mortality and how our lives are governed by the way God has designed the Creation is a powerful moment, a humbling moment, a way of being connected to the long line of Christians over the centuries who have had their heads smudged with Ash at the beginning of Lent. It is a gateway,



really, into a time of reflection on our relationship with God and abstinence from things that distract us from this relationship.

I hope that on February 14th, you will join us in the sanctuary at 7 pm as we go through the ritual of **distributing the ashes. This is a time when we invite you to think about your life and how it's going and in** what ways God is seeking to be nearer to you. This is a time when we invite you to enter into the season of Lent with anticipation of meeting God anew as we take the journey with Jesus to the Cross and then to the Empty Tomb.

Our theme this Lenten season is Depth of Love: we will explore all the ways that Jesus' life, ministry, death and resurrection communicates to us God's presence and love and equally invites us in to lives of service, worship, learning and fellowship. Here is a poem by Jan Richardson that I think gathers us in the spirit of this impending season:

Blessing the Dust

All those days you felt like dust, like dirt, as if all you had to do was turn your face toward the wind and be scattered to the four corners

or swept away by the smallest breath as insubstantial -

did you not know what the Holy One can do with dust?

This is the moment we ask for blessing

that lives within the ancient ashes, that makes its home inside the soil of this sacred earth.

- So let us be marked not for sorrow. and let us be marked not for shame. let us be marked not for false humility or for thinking we are less than we are
- but for claiming what God can do within the dust.... (Jan Richardson)



Snow, snow, snow, and COLD! That has been our year so far. From multiple big snow falls and blizzards, to -20 temperatures with a windchill that makes me shiver just thinking about it! Winter definitely has come in full force this year. While some of you might have had to go to work, others of you might have gotten to enjoy a nice snow day, looking out the window at the winter wonderland. For some people, the thought of snow removal never crosses their minds, others just appreciate being able to get to church on Sunday mornings. With a 350-car parking lot, a city block's worth of sidewalks, 14 exterior doors, 9 staircases, and two ramps, there's a lot of area to clear every time it snows. We started the winter season with 5,000 lbs of ice melt and rock salt. At the time of writing this, 1,150 lbs of that has been used. With the warmer melting days ahead, that number will increase a lot as we will have to put down more ice melt each morning to deal with the refreeze. The plow trucks have logged 17hrs plowing our lots so far and the snow mountains are growing. The number of hours spent shoveling is even greater. As much as I don't like snow, I rejoice in the gift of snow for what it does for us. Snow insulates tree roots and keeps them safe from freezing, and provides much needed water for replenishing our aquifers, lakes, and streams. Snow also gives a fresh look to everything, covering the often gray



and tired look of winter. Thank you to the members who stop by every week and make the snow removal worth it. Also, please be safe. If the roads or weather are bad, you can always tune into our worship service, livestreamed on Facebook or Youtube. See you soon!

G.S. Nichols Scholarship Awarded

G.S. Nichols Scholarships provide financial aid to students from Collegiate/Wesley who plan a career of Christian service. A scholarship for the 2023-2024 academic year has been awarded to Jason Ellingson by the G.S. Nichols Scholarship Fund Board of Directors.

Jason is attending St. Paul School of Theology, a United Methodist Seminary in Leawood, Kansas. He is in the final year of the three year Doctor of Ministry program. Jason has been an active member of CUMC/WF, in Stephens Ministry, served on Administrative Council, and has volunteered in many activities.

G. S. Nichols Scholarships were established in 1959 to honor the long-time pastoral ministry of G.S. (Sam) Nichols, who served Collegiate United Methodist Church and Wesley Foundation for 25 years. Only the earnings from our funds are available for scholarships. We welcome and appreciate memorials, bequests, and other donations to increase the principal and interest generated.

In the 61 years since the first G.S. Nichols Scholarship was awarded in 1962, more than \$208,000 have been awarded to 53 students.

So.....do you like "Shalom?"

If someone visiting our church asked you what was happening at the close of worship when we sing that to one another, what would you tell them? Is it meaningful to you? To everyone? Has it endured?

What do you think about services that close without singing it (like the Christmas services we just celebrated in December)? Is church incomplete without that piece or does church still "count" if we don't sing it? Have you ever visited another church that sings "Shalom" to close worship? Was something else used or nothing at all?

Here is my final question: when it comes time for "Shalom," do you actually sing it? Sing it with your full voice? Sing it like you actually believe it means something? Like it is important to wish peace, good health, and overall well-being to those around you?

If we do any of these things during worship I feel that it is important that we hold it in our minds that it means something that we do them. Otherwise we should follow the advice of a disgruntled congregant from the last Lutheran church I served in Massachusetts: "during worship all I need is the CONFESSION and the CREED." (Note that music and a sermon were not on his list.)

In a medieval Anglican tradition, the last Sunday before Advent is called "Stir Up" Sunday. The appointed collect prayer for that day:

Excita, quæsumus, Domine, tuorum fidelium voluntates: ut divini operis fructum propensius exsequentes, pietatis tuæ remedia maiora percipiant: Per Christum Dominum nostrum. Amen.

Translated:

Stir up, we beseech thee, O Lord, the wills of thy faithful people; that they, plenteously bringing forth the fruit of good works, may of thee be plenteously rewarded; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

So whether or not "Shalom" is your favorite, or any other part of worship, perhaps we should make it matter that we were in worship together. STIR UP the air around you and make what we do matter.

Otherwise what are we doing here?

Iowa Migrant Movement for Justice is a statewide immigration legal service organization that provides free or low-cost, high quality immigration legal assistance to low-income immigrants in Iowa. Recently they have expressed a willingness to bring low-cost legal services to Story County. Many of us have heard and know of the need for this service in Story County, where low-cost, affordable *immigration* legal assistance just doesn't exist. In order to expand into Story County, Iowa MMJ needs to hire additional legal staff and have funding for this. A group of interested local partners are leading the effort with Iowa MMJ for this to happen. The initial goal is to raise \$50,000 in the first months of 2024 to have the clinics start in Story County summer 2024.

- Only 1% receive public assistance (food stamps/SNAP benefits/Social Security); immigrants have limited access to critical resources
