Dear Collegiate/Wesley friends,

You've just opened up *the last issue* of the Communicator newsletter. Maybe you've been reading it for years. Maybe you rarely get to it. Maybe you haven't really connected with this monthly news source that's been linked to every weekly email we send.

We're discontinuing the Communicator because it isn't communicating very well. One of our goals for 2025 has been to improve our communications. We decided to start here. Here's why:

The Communicator isn't really getting read. Even if YOU, personally, read it every month, and get all the way through, most don't. I was surprised to hear that said, jokingly, in many settings after I arrived a year ago. "Nobody reads the Communicator." On further asking many of you directly, I've heard that sentiment from highly engaged leaders, from newer attenders, and a whole range of folks in between. It's not an effective means of communicating to most of you.

Which means, the big-picture news and updates we share there don't get through. We've used the Communicator for news that requires explanation, for updates to ongoing projects, for celebrating accomplishments, and for other items (like thank-you notes) that don't quite fit the weekly email. That email was meant as a supplement to the newsletter, with mostly brief promos and reminders, alongside the prayer list and what's happening in worship that Sunday. But the news we've shared through the newsletter isn't getting to many of you.

The monthly Communicator misses mid-month developments. In an active church where plans come together unpredictably, some news comes too late for one month's newsletter but is already over before the next one. A monthly newsletter is out of date almost as soon as it's published. People who only read the Communicator—and we do have a few whom we send a hard copy—miss out on the things that happen with short notice.

It's hard to read the Communicator on your phone. The Communicator is designed as a full-page printable document, and when you open it on your phone, the print is quite small, and if you stretch it bigger, you can't read across a whole line of print. Since many of you use your phone to read email, this clunkiness interferes with you diligently reading the whole newsletter. Our email uses newer technology designed to fit the device where it's being read—phone, tablet, or computer—so, perhaps unsurprisingly, you more reliably read that.

With all these realities, it seems clear that the production of the monthly Communicator is no longer a wise use of our staff's time. We will refocus that time on the look and content of our weekly Thursday email, whose weekly rhythm spreads out the work more evenly and gets developments communicated sooner. By mid-August, you'll start receiving an updated version of that email where you'll find:

- A brief weekly reflection from me or another staff member, or sometimes a guest writer;
- A preview of that weekend's worship;
- Of course the week's prayer list, which some of you have named as the thing you most consistently read;

- Announcements and calendar items;
- Other news, recaps, and updates on ongoing projects that we've previously published primarily in the Communicator. We hope you'll be glad to check in on these subjects that are happening in our life together here at C/W.
- A bottom section where you can find links (like to our livestream, giving page, or other items) that don't change much but will keep you from having to go searching.

Some of you are already wondering whether these changes will make the weekly email fearsomely long. We will be monitoring that, but our strategy on longer items will be to publish only the opening paragraph or so in the email, with a link to the rest of the piece in the "news" page (under "Coming Up") on our website. These updates will be posted on a rolling basis, so you'll always be able to learn about the newest developments by scrolling through those headlines.

A few of you will be reading these words on a printed copy of the Communicator that we mail to you each month. We haven't forgotten you! We'll print and mail you a copy of the weekly email every week—so you'll be in on the weekly news. For longer items of general interest, we plan to print the longer article from our website and include it along with the printed email. We'll be listening for your feedback, but we think you'll find it an improvement overall.

As with all things, this process will no doubt have its glitches. Please be patient as we work through the details. We'll be asking for your feedback in six weeks or so. And once we get this work moving smoothly, we'll turn to the next things—our website (supported by an Endowment grant!), and our livestream and other worship-related communications.

If what I've shared here leaves you unsettled, we hope you'll take a breath, notice those feelings, and commit yourself to trust the good intentions of all involved. I hardly need to point out (but I will!) that while the *form* of communication changes over time, the goals remain steadfast. We no longer rely on smoke signals and parchment scrolls to convey information, nor mimeographed pages and faxes. You're probably a member of multiple organizations that long since stopped printing a monthly newsletter.

Last week Rev. Fred Lewis reminded us, in those ancient words from Habakkuk, to "write the vision," "make it plain" (3.2). Yes. What we're doing right now partakes of that purpose.

The fruits, which are persistent (i.e. they do not drop) attract birds. The encircling bed features hostas, hellebores, brunnera, and sedum. Meet Your Campus Minister: Rev. Jena J. Finch-Manchester Campus ministry often begins with a nudge—a text, a conversation, or a memory that tugs at your heart. For me, it started with a message from a few of my former high school students who were now attending lowa State. They told me they missed our Bible study and asked, "Would you consider starting one again?" I laughed when they offered to drive to me, but after prayer and discernment, I found myself driving to Ames instead. What I didn't expect was to find open doors and warm hearts at Collegiate United Methodist Church and Wesley Foundation.

Though I'm newer to formal campus ministry, nurturing the faith of young adults has long been part of my story. I understand that campus ministry has changed. Sunday evening meals are covered by the school. Laundry can be done at any time. Students have different needs than we ever imagined. And yet, they still long for community and authentic relationships.

Outside of ministry, I'm blessed with two adult sons and their wonderful families. Ben and Katie live in Des Moines with their daughter Elaine—named after my mom—and their big dog Orzo. Jonathan and Emily live in Duluth, MN, with their pup Mamet (named after the playwright) and Emily's son, Aspen. I love to kayak in the summer (I have two—call me!) and cross-country ski in the winter.

I'm honored to serve as your Associate Pastor and Campus Minister. Being present with students during these transformative years—listening, praying, sharing, and laughing—is not just meaningful work, it's sacred. Site Analysis Update

A Site Analysis Update: SO CLOSE

You wouldn't know it, but our Site Analysis work has been moving forward over the summer and we *can't wait* to share it with you. We're actively working on plans to do so after the academic year begins again and you all are back in town and, we hope, ready to listen and consider and move toward some decisions!



After intensive discussions with you all in February, which gave us the feedback we needed to share with our consultant (BBS), and after conversations in March with updates about properties and priorities, we still had work in progress and questions to answer before we'd be ready to share next steps out loud, with you all.

But during these months, the Site Analysis Oversight Team (SAOT) has been in conversation with our Church Council, with a consensus on some items we're moving forward. So *stay tuned* for times and places where we'll roll out insights, next steps, and a process toward decisions about the optimal use of our properties. We aren't there yet, but we will be, very soon.

As we've previously asked, please be praying for this process. Our SAOT members—Jeff Elver, Max Morris, David Orth, Ann Sandine, Chris Strawhacker, and Pastor Lee—are committed to seeing this through, even though this work has stretched longer than we initially expected. Thanks to all for you engagement in the process so far, and for your patience along the way.



Wax on, wax off, and wax on again! I'm not quite sure Mr. Miyagi would enjoy this type of work, but it could be material for a sequel. Summer is in full swing here at CUMC/WF which means summer maintenance! This summer I'm working on parking lot repairs, Wesley Hall, and numerous painting and flooring tasks. Recently, we converted a few handicapped parking spaces into van accessible spaces so we could be more accommodating to everyone.

Now that things are heating up, I've started on the inside projects too. This week I completed the stripping of all the layers of old dirty wax in Wesley Hall and laid down several layers of new wax. Yes, the wax is dry, though all of Wesley Hall looks like its wet still! Hopefully the floor will be protected for years to come (see pictures below). To help protect and preserve it, I replaced all the feet on the tables with fresh rubber ones. New outlets in Wesley Hall with safety shutters and new lights in the kitchen are also in the works.

Still to come this summer are new windows in Wesley Hall, the Reading Room, and the North Pine room. The reading room will be repainted and the Gathering Space will receive some fresh paint as well! Sooner than we think, we will back to Sunday school and using all these refreshed spaces. Have a

Emergency Fund for Immigrants and Refugees

The Ames Area Immigration Network has a new emergency fund available to help with rent and/or utilities for families who have had an income loss due to changes in immigration policy. If you know an immigrant or refugee who has lost work authorization, or a family member has been detained or deported and their income is no longer sufficient to pay for housing or utilities, email story.immigrants.fund@gmail.com and request an application. The completed application needs to be returned to story immigrants fund@gmail.com and will be reviewed. If you are eligible for

be returned to <u>story.immigrants.fund@gmail.com</u> and will be reviewed. If you are eligible for consideration, you will be contacted by a caseworker to discuss your circumstances. All information will be kept confidential. The Ames Area Immigrant Emergency Fund is for Ames area residents only and is not intended to be long term assistance.
